



OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE TOURISM SECTOR

The study identifies key challenges, including underdeveloped infrastructure and limited international awareness, and proposes strategic solutions such as sustainable tourism models, investment attraction, and capacity building among local communities. Introduction

Tourism is a key driver of economic development in many regions around the world, offering not only economic benefits but also cultural exchange and environmental awareness. The Republic of Karakalpakstan, with its rich history, diverse cultural heritage, and stunning natural landscapes, holds significant untapped potential for tourism development. The region’s unique assets include ancient fortresses, such as Ayaz-Kala, the world-famous Savitsky Art Museum, and the Aral Sea, which despite its environmental crisis, remains a site of interest for eco-tourism and scientific research. However, challenges such as limited infrastructure, environmental degradation, and a lack of international recognition hinder the full realization of this potential. This article seeks to examine the opportunities and challenges facing Karakalpakstan’s tourism sector and offer practical recommendations for its sustainable development. Tourism in the Republic of Uzbekistan is becoming one of the leading sectors of the economy, and the state has set a number of priority tasks for the development of the tourism sector in the framework of building a New Uzbekistan. In particular, the Head of State, at the 25th session of the World Tourism Organization held in Samarkand on October 16 of this year, emphasized that this year a total of 7 million tourists will visit our country, and it is planned to increase this figure to 15 million by 2030, and the flow of domestic tourism to 25 million, and that the strategy being developed for the comprehensive development of tourism until 2030 will pay priority to the creation of modern tourism and transport infrastructure, the construction of new high-speed roads and railways,

the expansion of the air transport fleet by 2 times, the increase in the number of air flights by four times, and the creation of 30 large tourism clusters in large cities and tourist destinations.

Of course, it is also advisable to make extensive use of the tourism potential of the regions in ensuring the implementation of these tasks. In particular, the effective use of tourism resources in the Republic of Karakalpakstan is also of great importance. If we pay attention to the work carried out in the field of tourism in the Republic of Karakalpakstan, it can be seen that in 2022, 50.1 thousand foreign tourists and 600.8 thousand local tourists visited, tourism exports amounted to 138 million. dollars, and 57 tour operators and travel agents operated. If we analyze tourists visiting from abroad by country, we can see that they mainly came from Russia, Kazakhstan, France, Turkey, Germany, Italy, Spain, Great Britain, the USA and China. What should be paid attention to in order to fully utilize all opportunities to attract tourists to the Republic of Karakalpakstan?

Tourist sites on the Nukus-Kungrad road. The archaeological and architectural complex of Mizdakhkan (4th century BC - 15th century AD) was studied by Professor A.O. Yakubovsky in 1928-1929. The name of this city, which was mentioned several times in the works of its authors as having lived in the Middle Ages (Ibn Rusto, 906-913; al-Istakhri, 961; based on the work of al-Balkhi, which has not reached us, 919-920), is mentioned as "Mizdakhkan" ("Mardakhkan"). Al-Muqaddasi (985) writes: "Mizdahkan is a large [city], around which there are 12 thousand fortifications and an endless province (except for Gurganj, the capital of Khorezm), the rest of the cities are densely populated and surrounded by defensive walls. Mizdahkan is the largest among them. It is almost equal in area to Jurjaniya, and its surroundings are also surrounded by fortified walls [places]." Traces of the ancient city have been preserved on the western hill in the form of the ruins of Gaurkala (IV-III centuries BC). The Mizdahkan complex consists of architectural monuments of both the Middle Ages and much more ancient Islam and Zoroastrianism, such as the Jomart Kassab Hill, the tombs and khanqahs of Shamun Nabi, Khalfa Rajab, Mazlumkhan Suluv, and others. During archaeological excavations, fragments of architectural ornaments with book-like inscriptions, created by the local population, were also found here, mainly in Kufic and, rarely, in the style of Naskh script. Davut Ata is considered a descendant of the legendary Kazakh batyr Barak Batyr. His father Asov and grandmother Barak were buried near the border of Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan, among the Sam sands. His grave is in the territory of the cemetery that now bears his name in the Kungrad district of the Republic of Karakalpakstan. The keystone inside his tomb indicates the year of his death (1623). A marble stone installed in 1984 gives an unclear (presumably incorrect) date: 1750-1826. The monument and cemetery are located on the slopes of the Ustyurt plateau. The mausoleum that exists today was built in the 1980s and 1990s.

Tourism Potential of Karakalpakstan. Cultural Heritage Karakalpakstan boasts a rich cultural heritage that includes historical landmarks and museums. The Savitsky Art Museum in Nukus, often called the 'Louvre of the Steppe,' is an iconic institution that preserves the region's cultural artifacts and contemporary art. Additionally, ancient sites like Ayaz-Kala and Toprak-Kala provide visitors with a glimpse into the region's ancient history, making them prime tourist destinations.

Natural Attractions. The natural landscapes of Karakalpakstan, including the vast Ustyurt Plateau and the remaining parts of the Aral Sea, offer vast opportunities for nature-based tourism. Although the Aral Sea has suffered ecological degradation, it still attracts tourists interested in environmental

tourism and rehabilitation projects. The desert and steppe regions are also ideal for adventure tourism, including trekking, off-road expeditions, and safari tours, offering a unique experience for travelers.

Cultural Traditions and Festivals. Karakalpakstan is rich in cultural traditions, including music, crafts, and festivals that could become significant tourism attractions. Traditional Karakalpak music, dances, and cuisine, as well as annual festivals showcasing local customs, offer the region an opportunity to promote cultural tourism. By leveraging these traditions, the region can attract international visitors seeking authentic cultural experiences.

Key Opportunities for Tourism Development.

Eco-Tourism and Sustainable Tourism Models. The global attention on the environmental crisis, particularly around the Aral Sea, has created an opportunity to develop eco-tourism projects focused on sustainability and environmental education. Karakalpakstan can position itself as a leader in eco-tourism by promoting the rehabilitation of the Aral Sea, preserving its ecosystems, and offering educational programs about environmental conservation. This will not only attract environmentally conscious tourists but also raise global awareness about the region's ecological challenges.

Adventure and Desert Tourism. Karakalpakstan's desert and mountainous landscapes provide a unique setting for adventure tourism. Activities such as desert camping, off-road adventures, and guided treks across the Ustyurt Plateau can appeal to a wide range of tourists, from adventure enthusiasts to photographers and researchers. These types of tourism offer a significant economic opportunity while encouraging travelers to explore lesser-known areas of Central Asia.

Infrastructure Development. The development of tourism infrastructure is crucial for attracting international visitors. Investments in transportation, such as better roads, regional airports, and improved public transport, would facilitate easier access to the region. In addition, building high-quality hotels, guesthouses, and hospitality services would ensure that visitors enjoy a comfortable stay. Investment in modern communication networks, such as reliable internet access, is also necessary to cater to the needs of both tourists and the tourism industry.

Digital Marketing and Promotion. In today's digital world, an effective online presence is essential for promoting tourism. Karakalpakstan can enhance its visibility by launching professional digital marketing campaigns on social media, travel platforms, and websites. Collaborating with international tour operators and travel agencies will also help position Karakalpakstan as an attractive destination within broader Central Asian and global tourism circuits.

Cross-Border Tourism. Karakalpakstan's geographical proximity to Kazakhstan and Turkmenistan opens up possibilities for cross-border tourism initiatives. Developing cross-border tourism packages that allow tourists to visit multiple destinations in Central Asia can increase the flow of international visitors to the region. These packages could highlight the cultural and natural diversity of the region and create an integrated tourism experience across neighboring countries.

Tourist attractions in Muynak district.

Hakim-ata shrine. Suleiman Bakyrangani is one of the brightest representatives of Sufism, formed in Islam, calling on humanity to achieve spiritual purity and maturity. He is known among the Turkic peoples by the name of Hakim-ata. This title was given to him by his teacher Khoja Ahmad Yassavi for his resourcefulness, knowledge and ability to think deeply. The main idea of the works that have been inherited from Hakim-ata Suleiman Bakyrangani is that a person should restrain his ego, repent, purify his soul and body, and refrain from striving for wealth and excess material possessions. A person should strive to be content and patient, fair and faithful.

Ajinyaz Kosibay uli shrine. Ajinyaz Kosibay uli is a Karakalpak poet. He studied at the old school, then at the Shergozikhan madrasah in Khiva. He was one of the first among the Karakalpak intellectuals to achieve the rank of akhund. He was fluent in Uzbek, Kazakh, and Turkmen. About 100 poems and epics have come down to us from Ajinyaz's literary heritage. His poems express patriotic and humanistic ideas. His works, such as "Need", "Should", "If Not", "Good", and "Guys", express Ajinyaz's humanistic ideas and philosophical views. His works are widely distributed among the people. The work "Conversation with the Maiden Mengesh" (1878) is famous. Tokpak Ata Shrine. Located in the Ush Sai village of Muynak district, on top of a high sand dune. The occurrence of the lines about Toqpa Ata in the works of Jiyen Jirov and Kunhoja: Toqpaqtan esti katty jel (Toqpaqtan esti katty jel), Bunnan bardim Hazireti Toqpaqka (From Bunnan bardim Hazireti Toqpaqka) indicates that he was known since the middle of the 18th century. The Hungarian scholar Vamberi, who visited this place in the 19th century, says that Toqpaq Ata was the "pir of fishermen", and that his cloak and household items were kept in the dome. There are folk stories that Toqpaq Ata, Buorakhan Ata, and Hakim Ata were disciples of Khoja Ahmad Yasawi. When Toqpaq Ata asked Khoja Ahmad Yasawi to become a pir, he lost his temper and drowned in his own ship, despite the fact that he was not yet an adult.

Practical Recommendations

- ✓ By focusing on eco-tourism and integrating sustainable practices, Karakalpakstan can attract environmentally conscious tourists and researchers. The region should invest in projects aimed at restoring the Aral Sea and preserving its unique ecosystems. Eco-tourism initiatives, such as nature reserves, eco-lodges, and guided eco-tours, could be developed to enhance tourism experiences while protecting the environment;
- ✓ Government and private sector investments in infrastructure, including transportation (roads, airports), accommodation (hotels, guesthouses), and communication networks, are essential. Public-private partnerships could be explored to improve infrastructure and make the region more accessible for tourists. Enhancing infrastructure will also create employment opportunities and contribute to local economic growth.;
- ✓ It is vital to invest in training programs for local communities to develop a skilled workforce in hospitality, tour guiding, and tourism management. Local involvement in tourism development will not only create job opportunities but also promote the cultural heritage of the region to visitors;
- ✓ Strengthening international partnerships with tourism organizations, tour operators, and travel agencies will help raise awareness about Karakalpakstan's tourism potential. Collaborative efforts can also lead to joint marketing campaigns, cross-border tourism initiatives, and sharing of best practices in tourism development;

✓ Karakalpakstan should leverage its rich cultural traditions by organizing annual festivals, art exhibitions, and cultural exchange programs. These events can serve as focal points for attracting international tourists. By collaborating with international cultural institutions, the region can showcase its unique cultural identity on the global stage.

The Republic of Karakalpakstan holds enormous potential for tourism development due to its rich cultural heritage, natural beauty, and strategic location in Central Asia.
