Language teachers understand the importance of pictures given in the textbook, but when they come in class, they sometimes forget to utilize the pictures, thus, they should “stop thinking about ...(their) teaching for a few moments and think about the picture and what ...(they) feel about it”.²

Encourage them to collaboratively describe what they see, utilizing the target language effectively. This dynamic activity promotes communication skills, critical thinking, and teamwork while making learning engaging and interactive.

There are some engaging picture-based activities for teaching grammar to young learners.

Caption Writing: Show students a picture and ask them to write a caption using a specific grammar point. For example, provide a picture of a busy street and have them write sentences using present continuous (e.g., “The people are walking quickly”).

Picture Dictation: Describe an image to the students, and they must draw what you describe. Use this activity to practice vocabulary, prepositions, and sentence structure.

Sequencing: Provide a set of images that tell a story (e.g., a sequence of a caterpillar turning into a butterfly). Students arrange the pictures in order and create sentences using past tenses.
